Course Description	This is a unique 4th year medical student rotation in a intensive outpatient community mental health center based on the assertive community treatment(full service partnership) model of managing a population of severe mental illness at risk for hospitalization. The student has the opportunity to work in a collaborative, integrated care setting with multiple disciplines (such as nursing, social work, psychology and recreational therapy) and to see patients in the field in a variety of settings, such as in shelters, board and cares, independent livings, skilled nursing facilities and private residences. There is exposure to outpatient psychiatric management of complex psychiatric presentations in a culturally diverse, socioeconomically disadvantaged setting. Students will follow patients across the care continuum, from home to clinic to hospital and understand the spectrum of health resources in Los Angeles County. There will be exposure to complex psychopharmacological management of psychiatric diagnoses with medical comorbidities and also the opportunity to participate in or observe family psychoeducation groups and other therapeutic groups. The student will gain an understanding of the role of health needs, disparities and social determinants of health in a population with severe mental illness. There is also a interface with mental health law, as students will gain familiarity with aspects of mental health law and interface with Mental Health Court such as LPS Conservatorships and Assisted Outpatient Treatment. The rotation will be based in the full service partnership clinic, with patient interactions divided between the clinic setting and the community setting in the field, under the supervision of the program attending Psychiatrist.
